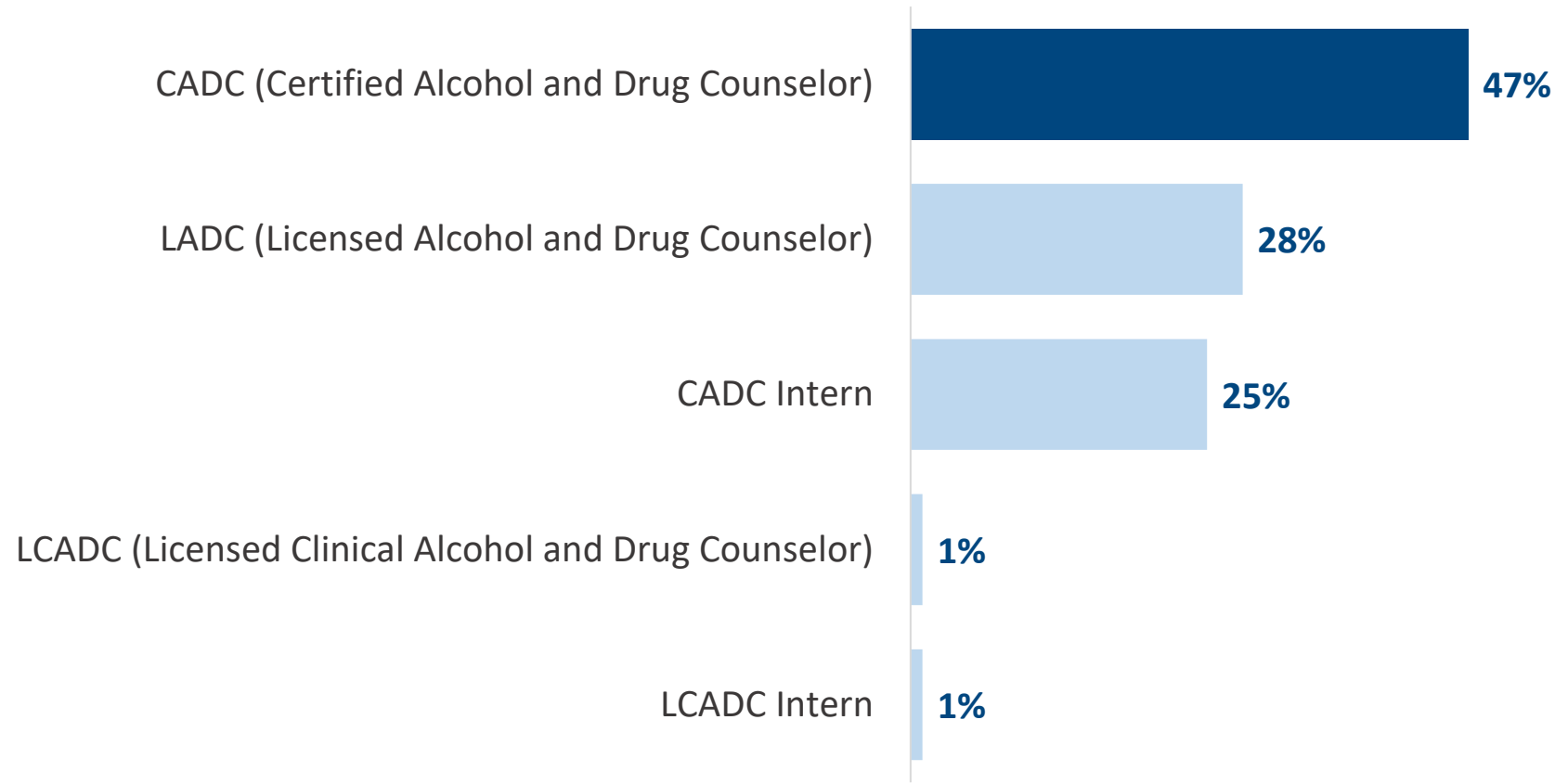


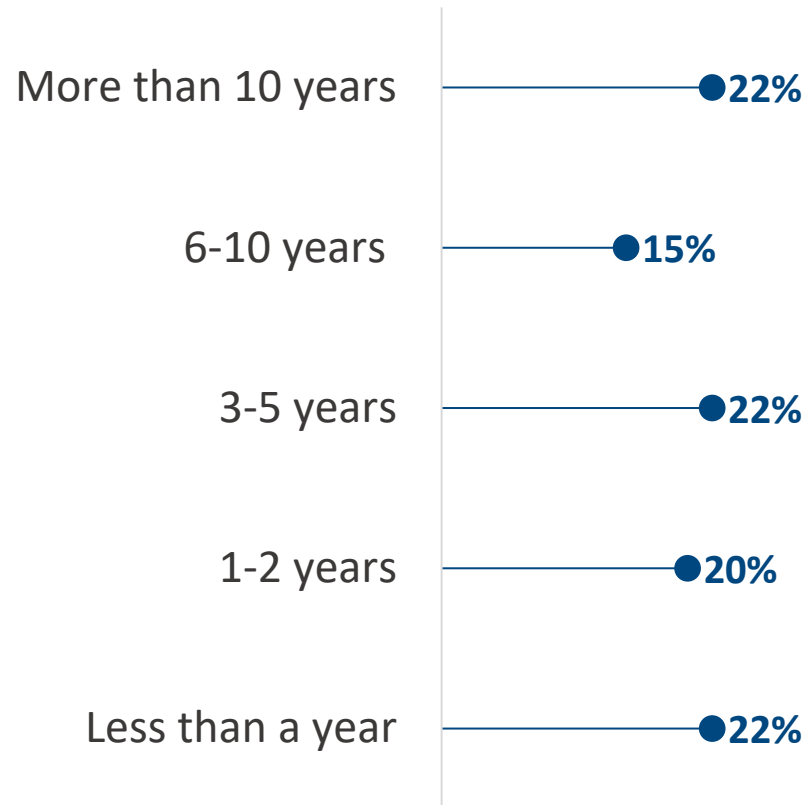
Problem Gambling Endorsement Interest Survey Results



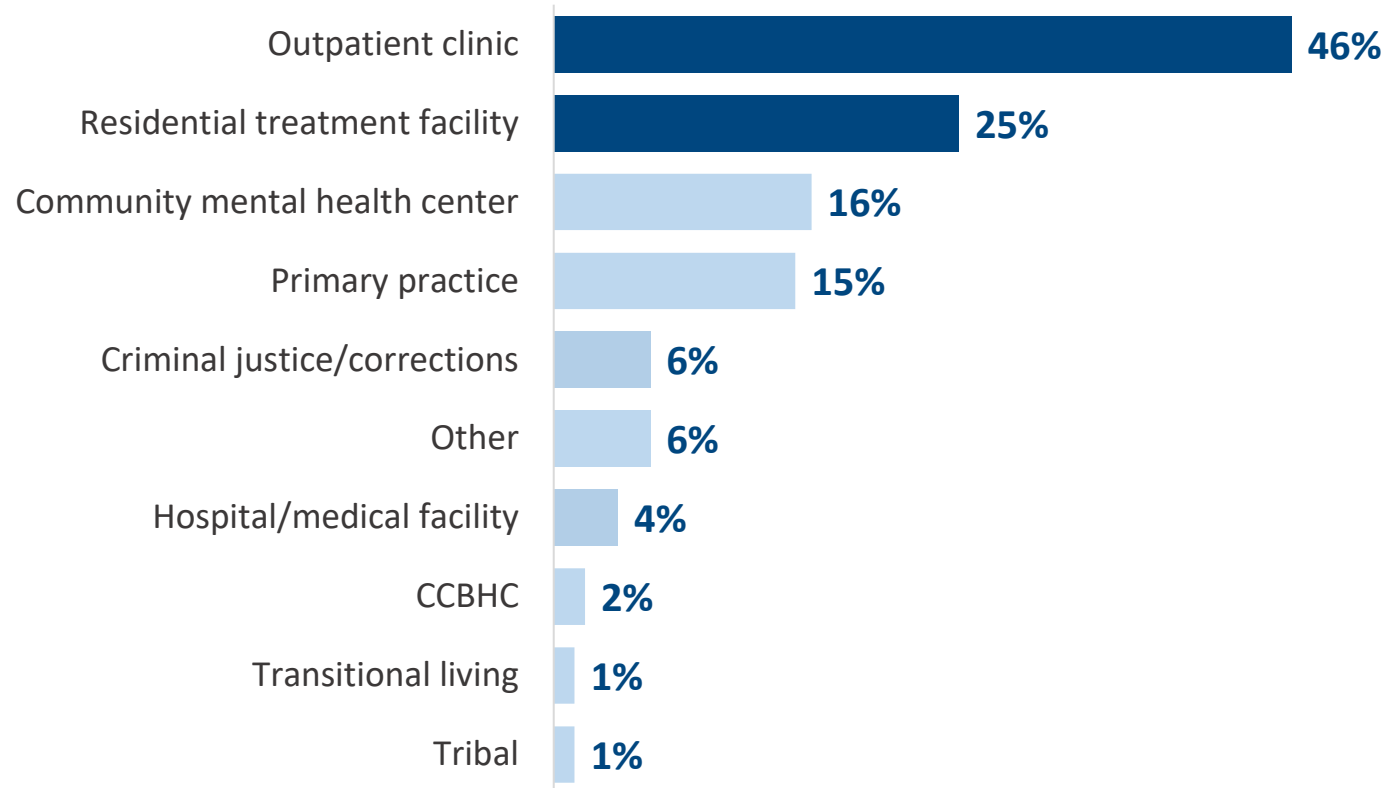
Nearly half (47%) of the survey respondent were CADCs.



The number of years that respondents held their licensure was fairly **evenly distributed**.

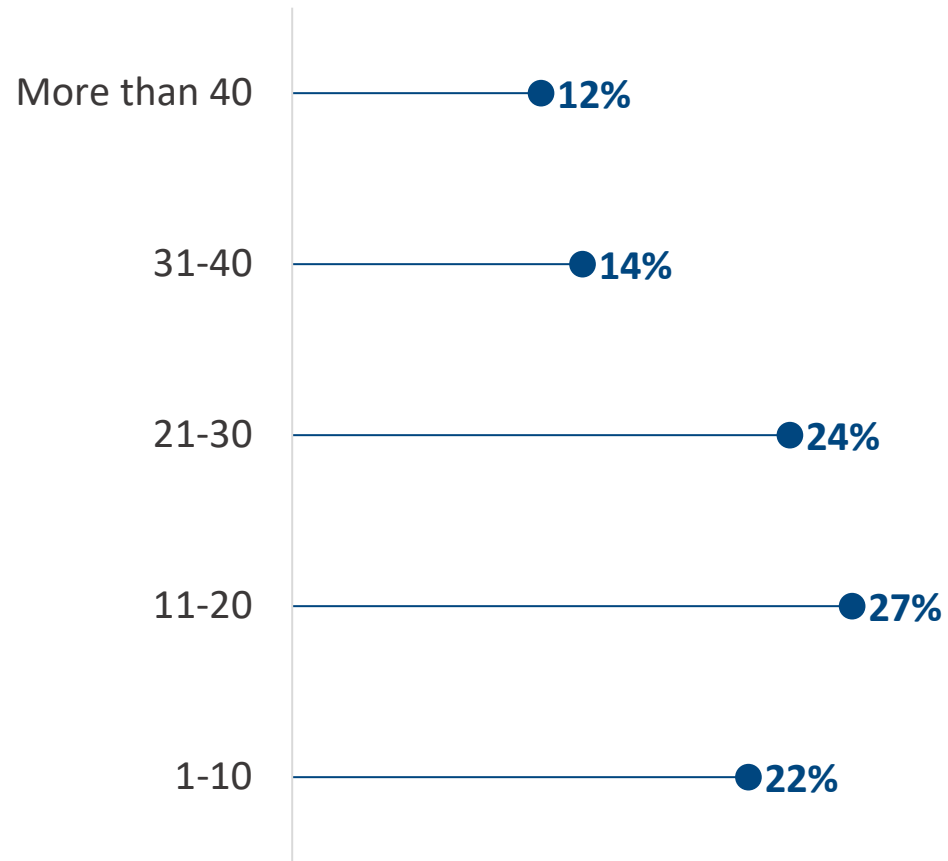


***Outpatient clinic and residential treatment facility* were the work settings indicated by the most respondents.**

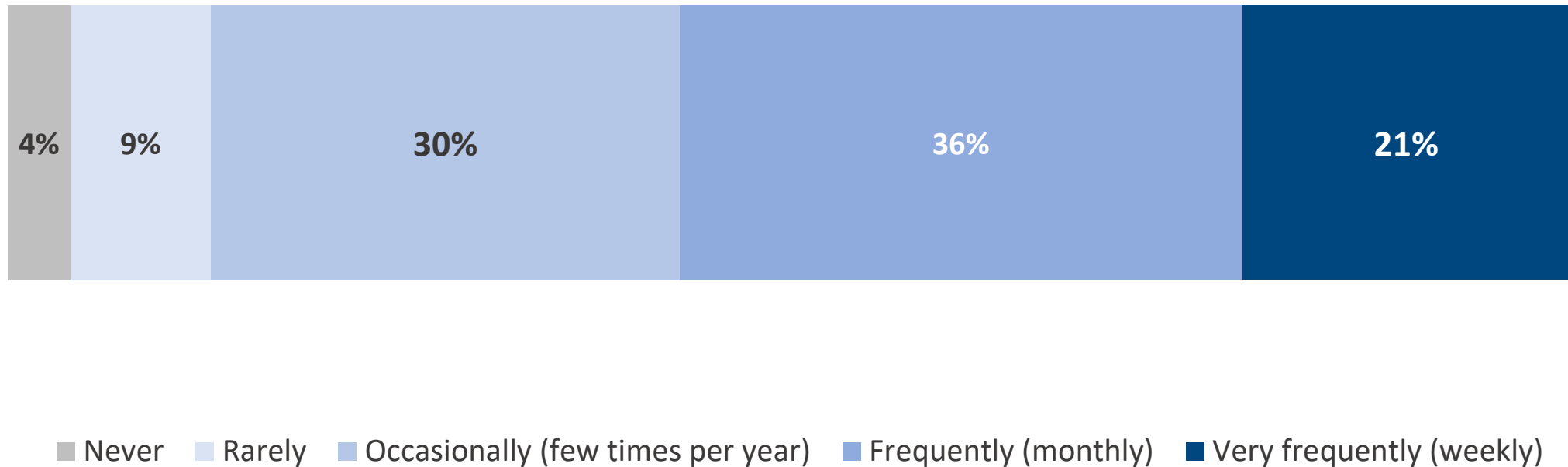

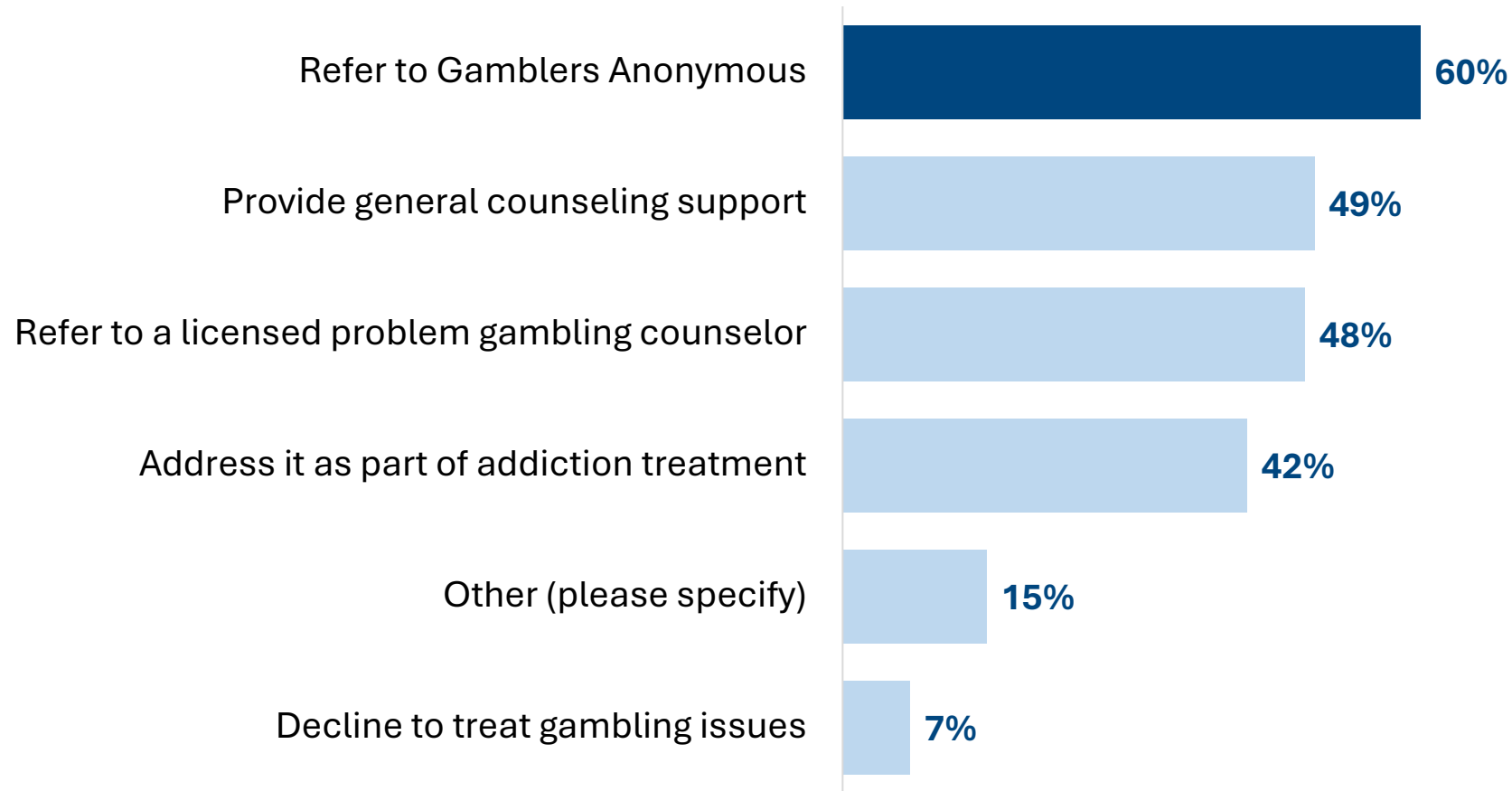
About one-quarter (22-24%) of respondents serve between **1 and 30 clients per week.**



Around one-third (30-36%) of respondents indicated that they encountered clients with gambling-related concerns in their practice *a few times a year* to *monthly*.



When they encounter gambling issues, the most common action was to **refer the client to Gamblers Anonymous**.



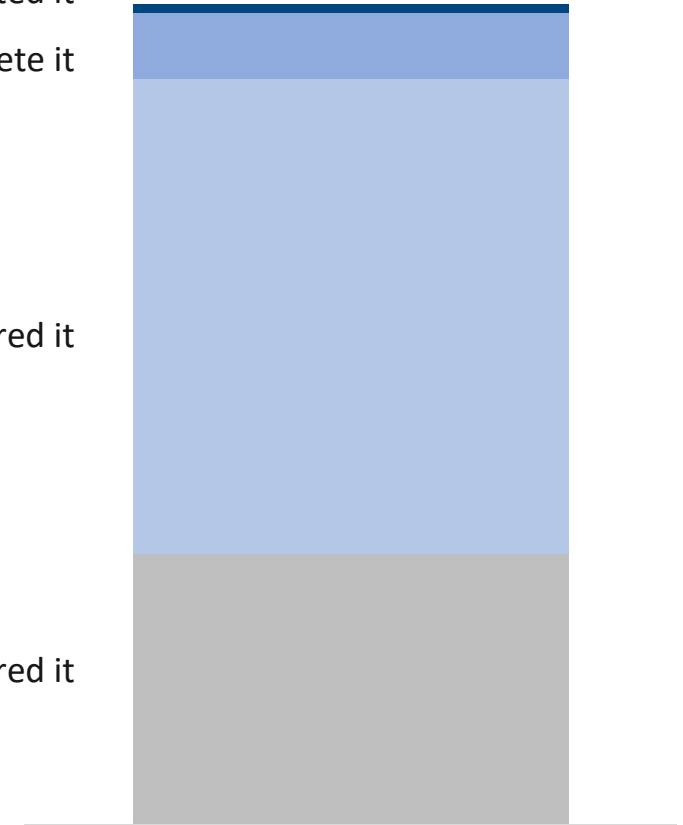

Over half (58%) of the respondents have **considered** pursuing the **Nevada problem gambling license**.

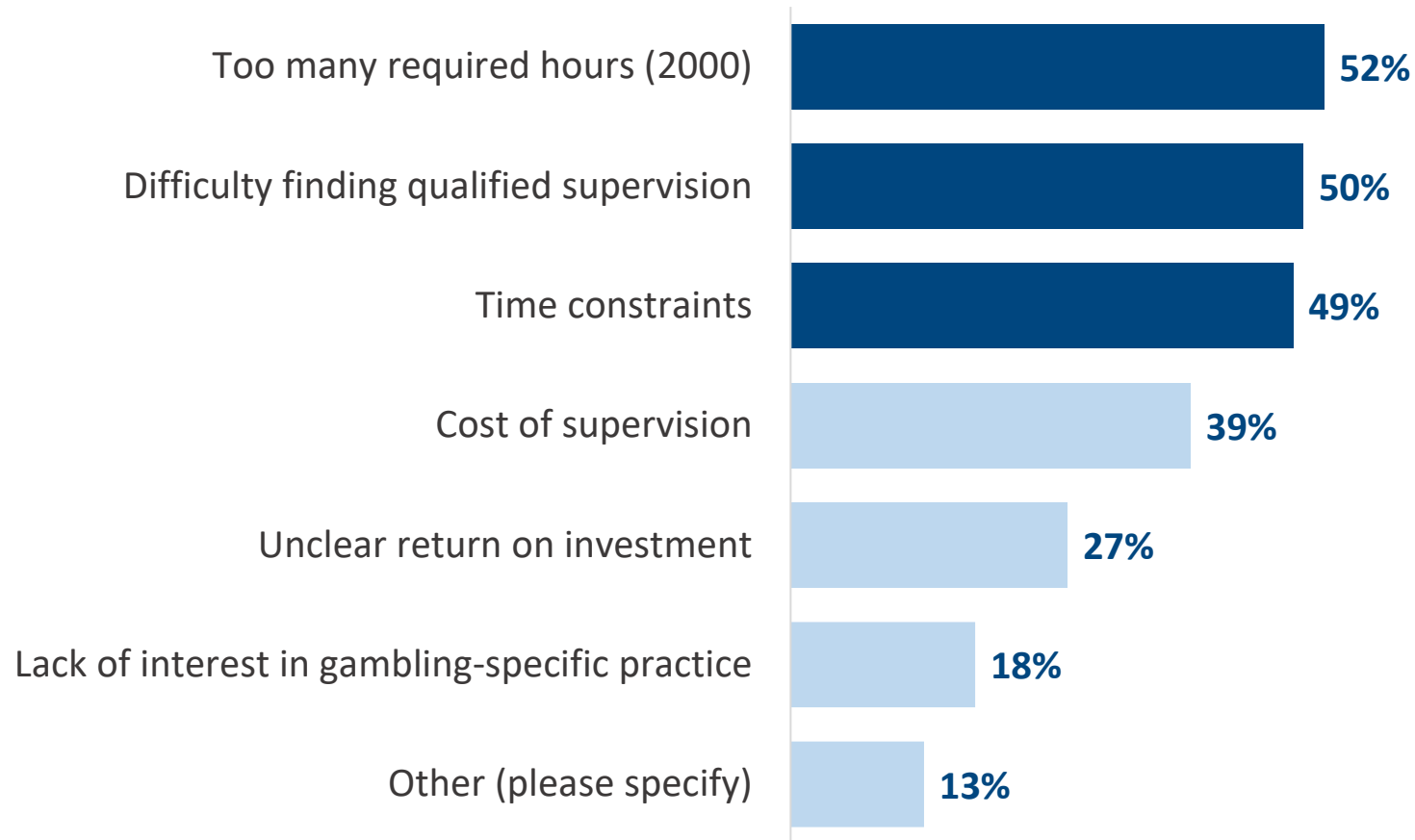
1% Yes, I completed it

33% No, never considered it

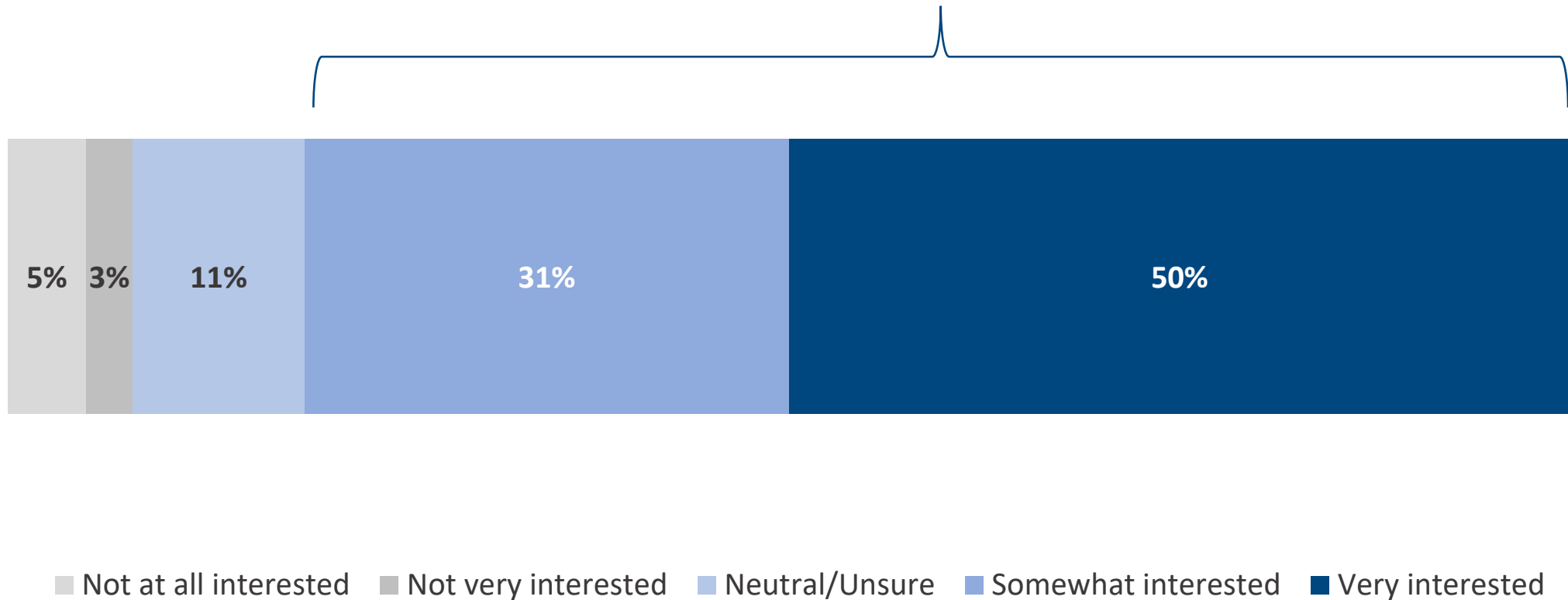


Nearly half of the respondents endorsed ***too many required hours, difficulty finding qualified supervision, and time constraints*** as barriers to pursuing a Nevada problem gambling license.

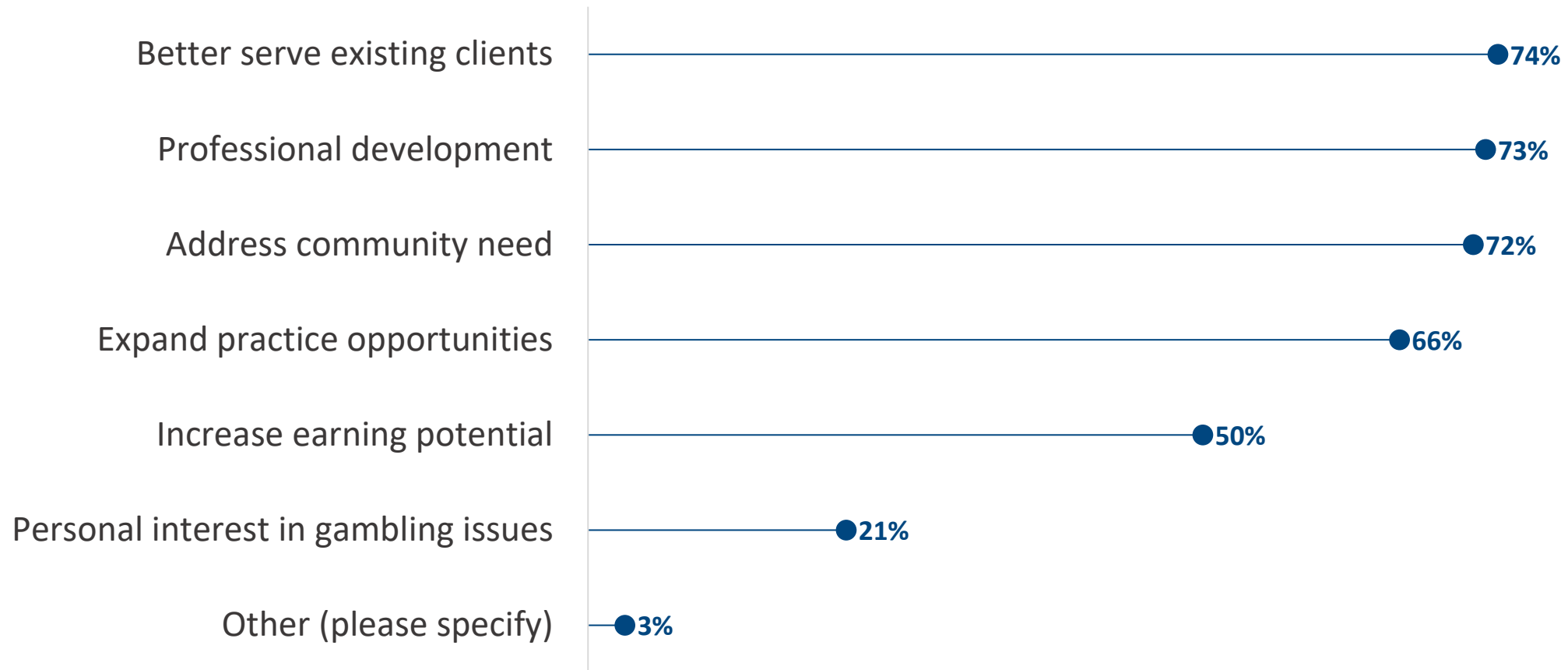

81% indicated they were interested in pursuing a Problem Gambling Endorsement option.



Better serving existing clients, professional development, and addressing community need were the motivators indicated by the most respondents as reasons for pursuing the endorsement.

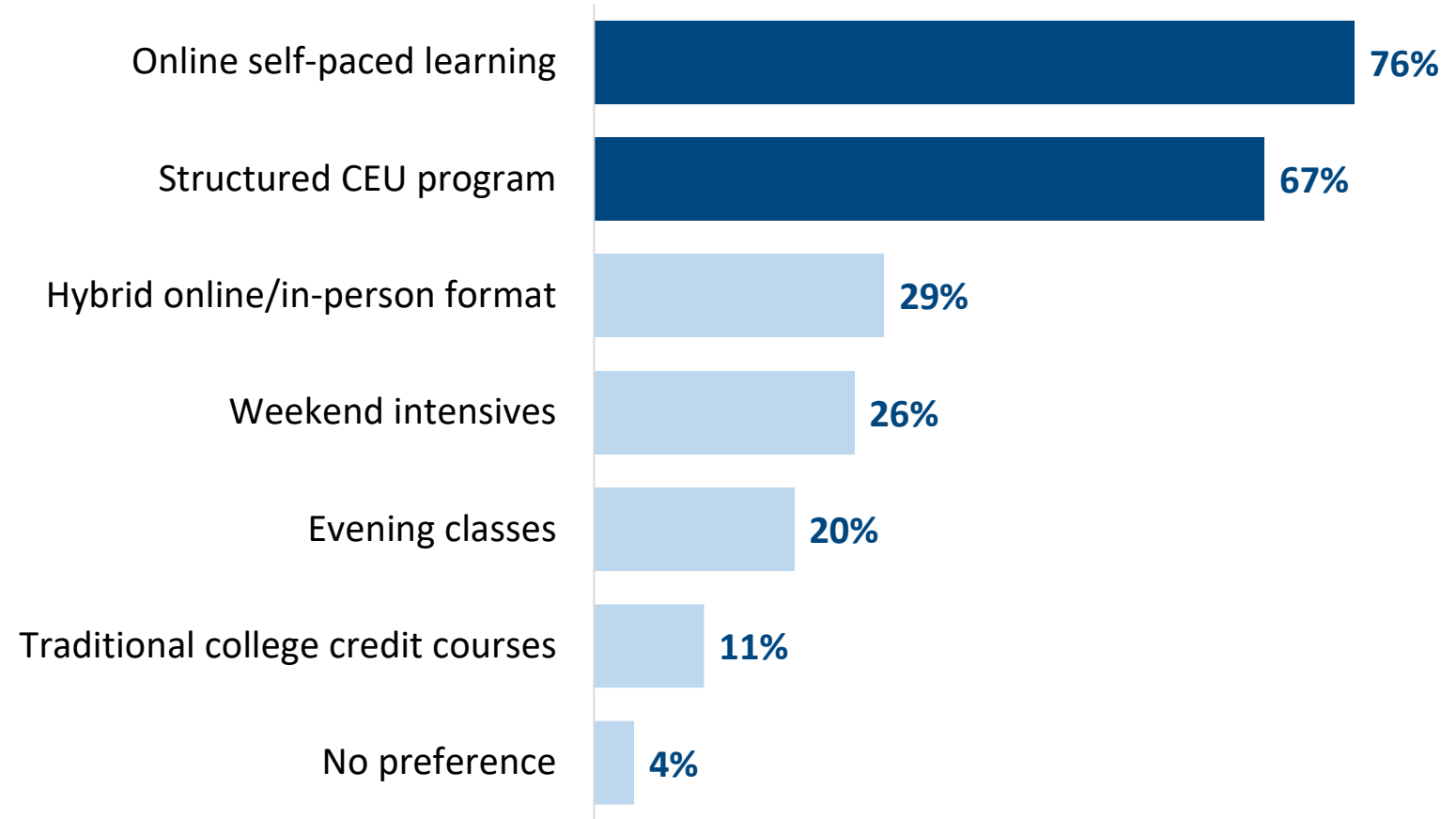

Three types of **financial barriers** were among the top barriers to pursuing the endorsement of a list of 35 barriers.

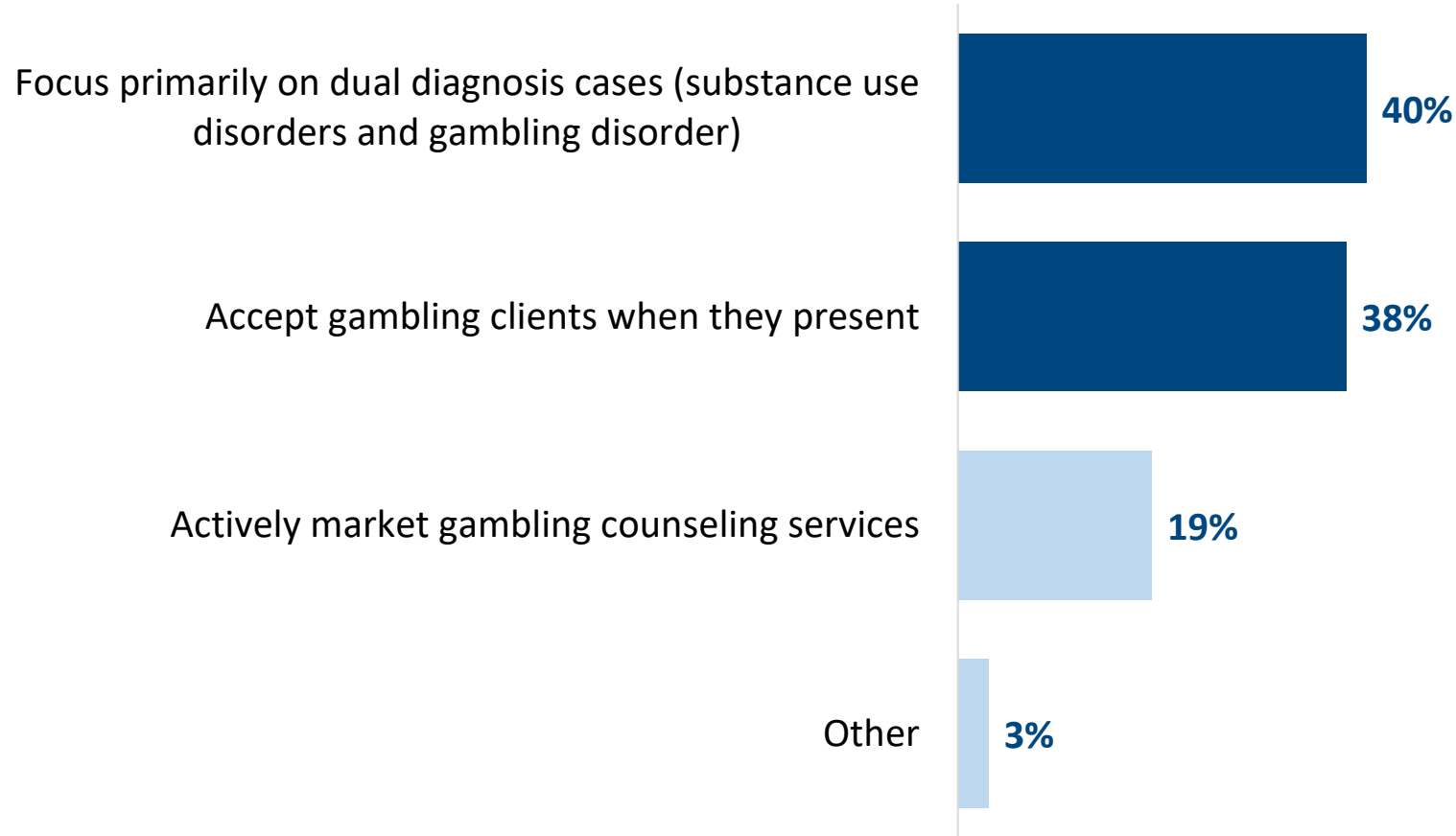

Online self-paced learning* and a *structured CEU program were the training formats preferred by the most respondents for earning the endorsement.

An equal number of respondents indicated they would use the endorsement to **focus primarily on dual diagnoses cases** and **accept gambling clients when they present**.



Most (87%) participants responded that they believed **a problem gambling endorsement would help address Nevada's shortage of gambling counselors.**
